If choosing to recuse, the Board Member should state for the record, all reasons for the recusal and that they will be leaving the meeting during the discussion and voting. As the City of Los Angeles works to address homelessness, Neighborhood Councils (NC's) are effective advocates and partners in this effort. NC's can utilize their power and join in efforts addressing homelessness through appointing a Homelessness Liaison (HL) for their NC. HL's will be vital in serving as community

representatives to move the needle on homelessness efforts. The Department of Neighborhood Empowerment supports HLs by fostering collaboration and information sharing among other City Departments, agencies and organizations engaged in enhancing government responsiveness to local outreach needs. To understand your role and commitment as a HL, please review the Department's updated Role of the Neighborhood Council Homelessness Liaison.

Unless the Bylaws or Standing Rules state otherwise, HLs are selected, with board approval required by the Neighborhood Council. After being selected the liaisons need to register themselves via <u>HL Registration Form</u>.

Election Season: Use Of NC Titled On Endorsements

As a part of the City of Los Angeles' governmental structure, neighborhood councils are not permitted to endorse political candidates or allocate funds to support or oppose candidates or ballot measures. However, individual members of the governing body are free to make personal endorsements, work for candidates, or contribute their personal funds, as long as it's done in their capacity as private citizens and not on behalf of the neighborhood council.

Tech Tips: How to Identify Spam Emails - A Guide for Everyone

In today's digital world, spam emails have become widespread. These unwanted messages fill our inboxes and

can sometimes even be dangerous. Knowing how to identify and deal with spam is key for anyone with an email account. This straightforward guide covers the basics that every email user should know. **Look Closely at the Sender**

Always inspect who the email is coming from. Be suspicious of senders you do not recognize, especially if the address looks almost like a real company. Spammers try to copy legitimate email addresses with tiny changes.

For example: <u>Com3uniction@empwla.org</u> instead of <u>Communications@EmpowerLA.org</u> Read Subject Lines Carefully

Spam emails frequently have flashy subject lines that grab your attention or create urgency. Avoid emails with subjects promising big rewards or demanding immediate action. These are common tricks spammers use. **For example:** Important Required Training Due Today-Please Open Now

Check for Errors

Professional organizations send polished emails. Watch for spelling mistakes, bad grammar, or awkward phrasing, which signals an email is probably spam.

Don't Click Unsolicited Links/Attachments

Never download files or click links from unknown senders. These could hide viruses or direct you to phishing sites to steal your information. Even if a company seems legitimate, first verify the email is authentic. **Notice Impersonal Greetings**

Spam rarely addresses you by name. Greetings like "Dear Customer" or "Hello User" typically signify spam.

Evaluate Offers Critically

Disregard emails promising deals too good to be true or requesting sensitive personal/financial details upfront. These are almost always scams.

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Trust Your Instincts

Delete emails if something seems suspicious, even if you cannot pinpoint why. Protecting your data is more important than opening every email.

Use Available Email Filters

Spam filters built into most email services can automatically detect and block spam. Adjust your filter settings to better suit your needs.

Stay Informed About New Spam Tactics

As techniques evolve, keep learning to identify new types of spam. Useful online resources and workshops make staying up-to-date simple.

With increased caution, awareness, and common sense, anyone can take control of their inbox and reduce spam. Remember, when in doubt about an email, deleting it is the safest option. Stay alert! - Drugs (including marijuana for medicinal purposes)



- The audience member will not be allowed into the Studio until the Security Officer is satisfied that the individual has nothing on his/her person that constitutes a danger to others.
- Should the guest refuse to be screened, they are subject to being denied access to Radford Studio Center property.
- NO FIREARMS OF ANY KIND ARE ALLOWED INSIDE THE STUDIO. Security Officers who detect that a guest is in possession of a firearm should notify the Security Supervisor and P.O. IMMEDIATELY.

- Off-duty Law Enforcement in possession of a firearm will be instructed to either return the weapon to their vehicle or turn it over to Security where it will be kept, UNLOADED, in a SAFE, located in the security manager's office.
- Any props or toys that resemble weapons in any way are to be denied or confiscated. This includes props / accompanying costumes.

Each guest/audience member will be required to submit a form of identification which will be tagged with an item that is confiscated and held with security. Guests and audience members will be instructed to pick up their confiscated items at the first (1st) level of the Sater parking structure near the elevators at the completion of the event. No personal pets are allowed at any time on the Studio lot.

If, at any time, an audience member or guest, wanders away from their event or meeting space, into an unauthorized area, that person is subject to immediate dismissal from the lot.
